DMI REGIONAL ASSEMBLIES: GOING BACK TO NORMAL... SOON

Six DMI regions in the country - Regions II, III, IV, V, VI and VIII - held their regional assemblies during the second and third quarters of the year wit three regions bravely 'testing the waters' going face-to-face and two regions having "blended" assemblies while one region still holding theirs online via ZOOM. Compiled in this issue are reports sent in by the Regional Newsette Correspondents on their respective assemblies.

REGION II Assembly - August 13, 2022

H"blended" regional assembly was held by Region II led by Region II Representative Sis. Virgie Cabero at the Our Mother of Perpetual Help Parish, Diocese of Cabanatuan for the face-to-face portion and the other dioceses participating via ZOOM and FB Live. A total of 253 DMI sisters from the circles of the Diocese of Cabanatuan attended the face-to-face assembly and the other dioceses of Region II participated via Zoom – the Archdiocese of Lingayen-Dagupan and the Dioceses of San Jose, San Fernando – La Union, and the Prelature of Infanta.

A concelebrated Mass with Bishop Sofronio Bancud, SSS, DD of the Diocese of Cabanatuan started the day's activity. Concelebrating with him were Fr. Mike Veneracion, pastor of the Our Mother of Perpetual Help Parish and Fr. Isidro Puyat, DMI diocesan spiritual director.

During his homily, Bishop Bancud expounded on the assembly theme "Journeying Together in Synodality and Discernment with the Blessed Virgin Mary". The enthronement ceremony took place after the Mass.

Region II Representative Sis. Virgie Cabero welcomed the assembly participants in her video message after the parade of circles followed by another video message from the International Regent Sis. Sionee Naraga who at the time was attending the Region IV Assembly in Bulacan. Pro-Life International Chairperson Sis. Marlin Abratique and Upliftment of Women Workers International Chairperson Sis. Lorie Manalansan rendered their mission reports and the programs of their respective missions via a big screen at the venue.

Pre-recorded videos of songs and dances by the Archdiocese of Lingayen-Dagupan, Diocese of Urdaneta and the Prelature of Infanta were also shown. The Diocese of San Jose sisters showed video scenes of their parish grounds accompanied by a song. The Diocese of Cabanatuan DMIs also presented a song and dance number. A DMI quiz with prizes also added fun to the event.



The first face-to-face assembly of Region V in close to three years took place on August 6, 2022 at the St. Alphonsus. Mary de Liguori Parish Church in Magallanes Village, Makati City.

Close to 300 DMI sisters representing 48 circles from the dioceses comprising Region V - the Dioceses of Antipolo, Cubao, Imus, Kalookan, Manila, Novaliches, Paranaque and Pasig - attended the assembly.

The day's activity started promptly at 8 am with the enthronement and consecration of the image of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The processional was led by Past International Regent Sis. Ruby Macario and International Vice-Regent for Luzon and Region V Representative Sis. Milde Tong with some International Officers and Regional Officers and Region V Diocesan Regents.

Sis. Milde welcomed the participants and in her opening message thanked them for "testing the waters" of coming together despite the threat of a covid-19 surge.

International Regent Sis. Sionee Naraga in her video message from Bohol extended her warm greetings to the assembly delegates and thanked them for the assistance they extended to victims of Typhoon Odette. She exhorted them to serve their parish and community through servant-leadership and the pursuance of the DMI Missions.

Regional Secretary Sis. Rose Enriquez acknowledged the presence of circle delegates through their respective Diocesan Regents - Sisters Mercy Ong of the Diocese of Antipolo, Jenny Quieta of Cubao, Zenia Velasco of Imus; Monique Bularan of Kalookan, Leah Molina of Manila, Edna May Landicho of Novaliches, Nenette Felipe of Paranaque and Lina Reyes of Pasig.

Keynoting the assembly was Msgr. Claro Matt Garcia, pastor of St. Alphonsus Mary de Liguori Parish who was introduced by Newsette Editor Sis. Sally Estrada. Among the concurrent positions that Msgr. Matt holds in the Archdiocese of Manila are as Episcopal Vicar, Office of Guest Priests and as director/promoter of the Marian Youth Movement.

Expounding on the assembly theme "The DMII: Journeying Together in Synodality and Discernment with Mary", he said that the word 'synod' refers to the path to be taken by the people of God who walk together, and 'synodality' enables people who walk together to listen to the Holy Spirit and God's Word while participating in the mission of the Church.

The Synod is one of the legacies of Vatican II. For St. Paul VI, it was meant to reproduce the image of the Ecumenical Council and reflect its spirits and method. For Pope John Paul I, he foresees that the organization of the Synod could be improved with the passing of time. Twenty years later, St. John Paul II saw that it could still be improved where collegial pastoral responsibility could be more fully expressed in a Synod. In 2006, Pope Benedict XVI approved changes in the provision of the Code of Canon Law and the Code of Eastern Churches which had been promulgated in the past. Meanwhile, Pope Francis encourages us to continue with the path of Synodality as this is what God expects of a third millennium church.

Thus through a two-year preparation process with local consultations and a pre-Synod assembly,

the Church listened and concluded that the "Church's Synodality is today's KEY in proclaiming and transmitting the faith".(The DMII had taken part in this phase of the Synodal Process. Please see page 23 for a summary of the document submitted to the Archdiocese of Manila.)

The decisions are arrived at after discerning and deciding based on a consensus that flows from obedience to the Holy Spirit. This is done with a Synodal Spirituality consisting of: 1) Humility; 2) Openness to conversion and change; 3) Leaving behind prejudices and stereotypes; 4) Overcoming Clericalism

and promoting participation; and 5) Continuing to dream, hope and pray for a better Church community.

A brief Question & Answer portion ended the speaker's presentation.

A Eucharistic celebration by Msgr. Matt followed the closing message by Sis. Lorie Manalansan, International Chairperson for Upliftment of Women Workers.

The Region V Assembly officially ended with the recessional and distribution of packed lunches. While bidding each other good-bye, the DMI sisters expressed the hope that their next gathering will be a bigger one. . . and soon.

DIOCESE OF CABANATUAN DMI CIRCLES PARTICIPATE IN DEP- ED'S BRIGADA ESKWELA



DIOCESE OF BALANGA SPONSORS LIVELIHOOD PROGRAM FOR PDLs' WIVES

Statistics in 2021 shows that 7,000 more individuals were put in jail due to peddling of drugs. Many of them were heads of families who turn to peddling drugs to be able to provide for the family. Once in jail, the PDL's family is left without a breadwinner.

The DMI's Upliftment of Women Workers Mission addresses this particular problem of the community. Four circles in the Diocese of Balanga led by the St. Dominic de Guzman Circle sponsored the training for livelihood of five wives of PDLs in Abucay, Bataan. Police Chief Major Dennis Duran assisted the DMI sisters in identifying the five wives who need help the most. The St. Catherine of Alexandria, Sto. Rosario and St. Michael the Archangel Circles assisted in the program.

The training in fish deboning and smoked fish (*tinapa*) processing was held last June 25, 2022 at the Science Building of the Bataan Peninsula State University, courtesy of University President Gregorio Rodis and Extension Office Director Dr. Bernadette Gabor. Ms. Maria Lea Gaudia of the Extension Office conducted the training.


Prior to the actual training, the circle's Upliftment of Women Workers Committee met the trainees at the St. Dominic de Guzman Parish Church on June 24 to brief them about the training, assuring them that it will

be for free, including food and transportation going to the venue. They were also given tweezers, a tool they will use during the training.


The trainees were taught how to debone milkfish (bangus) in not more than two minutes which will eventually earn for them P20 per deboned fish. They also learned to process smoked fish using their kitchen cookware such as pots and pans. The quality of the smoked fish they processed is comparable, in terms of taste and color, to those commercially prepared using drums and ashwood.

COLLECTION/UPCYCLING OF PLASTIC WASTES A DMI PRO-LIFE PROJECT

The St. Paul of the Cross Circle of the Diocese of Antipolo has jumpstarted an environmental project in cooperation with the The Plastic Flamingo or The PLAF, an organization that has ventured into projects addressing environmental problems in the country particularly plastic pollution.

The advocacy of The PLAF is to collect plastic wastes and transform them into eco-lumber for use in the construction of houses and other products for the home.

Envisioned to be a National Pro-Life activity, Sis. Marlin Abratique, International ProLife Chairperson for 2022-23, has requested Region V to run a pilot of the project as The PLAF's collection/drop-off points are located in the NCR with the Diocese of Anti polo through the St. Paul of the Cross Circle taking the lead. Other circles and dioceses in Region V will eventually follow.

Plastic wastes such as plastic wrappers and sachets, bottles and packaging of items ordered online (the condition is that they should be dry) are collected from the households of DMI sisters on specified days and brought to The PLAF's collection point near their area. (A list has been provided in the write-up about The PLAF webinar conducted in September, 2021 published in the October-December 2021 issue of the DMI Newsette.). The St. Paul of the Cross Circle plans to eventually make plastic waste collection a community-wide effort in SSS Village, Marikina City.

ABOUT THE PLASTIC FLAMINGO (THE PLAF)

The PLAF was founded by a French couple, Francois and Charlotte Lesage who traveled to Southeast Asia during their honeymoon and visited the Philippines after Thailand and Vietnam, they fell in love with our country and its beautiful tourist destinations. They learned that the Philippines ranks No. 3 (after China and Indonesia) in polluting the oceans of the world with plastic waste. It is believed that by the year 2050, there will be more plastic than fishes in our oceans, Thus the start of their advocacy.

Francois and Charlotte founded The Plastic Famingo in 2018 for the purpose of collecting and upcyling our plastic wastes. They formed a group to research and leter fabricated plastic wastes into usable products. The PLAF's fabrication plant is located in Brgy. Potatan, Muntinlupa City and makes eco-lumber and some other products offered at low prices for the construction of houses and other purposes.

The PLAF collects a wide array of plastic wastes from households and offices - plastic wrappers, sachets, bottles, plastic parts of broken articles, etc. the condition being they should be DRY.



During this pandemic, on-line shopping has become the common practice, An online-shopping package, no matter how small, uses plastic wraps much bigger and voluminous than the item ordered itself. It is hard to imagine how much more plastic waste is added to aggravate the already-grave condition of our environment.



DIOCESE OF CUBAO GRANTS SCHOLARSHIP TO 20 PDLs' CHILDREN

Twenty children of persons deprived of liberty (PDLs) were given scholarship by the DMI Diocese of Cubao for School Year 2022-23.



A PRO-LIFE WEBINAR: BASIC CONCEPTS OF HUMAN RIGHTS: PROMOTING THE CULTURE OF LIFE

A well-attended webinar took place last June 4, 2022 sponsored by the International ProLife Committee.

Resource speaker was Atty. Zosimo Abratique on the topic "Basic Concepts of Human Rights: Promoting the Culture of Life".

Atty. Abratique is the lifetime partner of Sis. Marlin. A former OIC, Regional Human Rights Director of the Commission of Human Rights of Region I and the Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR), he is at present the Senior Partner of the Abratique, Dumawing and Associates Law Office in Baguio City. Also a former Grand Knight of the Knights of Columbus, Pinehurst Council No. 5379, St. Joseph the Worker Parish, Pacdal, Baguio City, he is lecturer and speaker on other topics such as "Violence Against Women and their Children", Data Privacy Act and other related legislations.

During the seminar via Zoom attended by 312 participants from various DMI circles nationwide, Atty.

Abratique traced the evolution of human rights with the story of Creation up to the upheaval in the local setting in 1986 which gave birth to the present Philippine Constitution, its Bill of Rights and a government agency dedicated to the promotion and protection of human rights. He explained the different theories of the rise of societies, the conflicts within which gave rise to concepts of human rights being the limitations on the authority of societies over the individuals. He then explained the characteristics of human rights and the three basic rights enshrined in the Constitution right to life, liberty and property.

As the right to life is a supreme right, he gave an

overview of the threats to life as follows:

- 1. Poverty
- 2. Homosexuality and same-sex union
- 3. The problems of Overseas Filipino Workers
- 4. The devaluation of the Sacrament of Marriage
- 5. Divorce
- 6. Extra-judicial killings and the death penalty
- 7. Impact of mass media to family life

In wrapping up his sharing, he suggested reading the *Evangelium Vitae* or the Gospel of Life by St. John Paul II. He also discussed the famous case of Roe Vs. Wade on abortion now undergoing serious challenge in the Supreme Court of the United States.

To end his talk, he quoted the words of Sen. Jose W. Diokno: "Human rights are more than legal concepts; they are the essence of man. That is what makes man human. That's why they are called human rights. Deny them and you deny man's Humanity."

The welcome remarks by International MIM Chairperson Sis. Biennah Villanueva came next. In her message, she stressed the importance of having a deeper understanding of the different aspects of social media to become better promoters of morality in media.

International Regent Sis. Sionee Naraga in her inspirational message encouraged the DMI sisters in their role in promoting good media as part of their mission.

Sis. Ma. Caroline Soliven-Elarcosa of the Immaculate Conception-Karangalan Circle, Diocese of Pasig





made a thorough introduction of the speaker who happens to be her partner for life. They just got married last year.

Mr. Ron Mark explained social media as one kind of multiverse where information thrives. It is important to note, however, that not all information here are necessarily good and true. As users of social media , we can be virtuous people, but if we are not careful, we can also become corrupt people.

With social media, infodemic or the rapid spread of information seems inevitable and as promoters of morality in media the participants were reminded by the speaker to be mindful of misinformation, disinformation and malinformation. Specifically fake news in the context of the Church, Mr. Ron Mark gave tips on how these can be fought. For his final advice, he assured his audience that for as long as they continue to Discern, Make sacrifices and Imitate the virtues of the Blessed Virgin Mary, they will be able to promote morality in media.

A certificate of appreciation for his scholarly and impactful talk was presented to Mr. Ron Mark by Sis. Biennah. MIM Coordinator for Mindanao Sis. Annie Ty gave her closing message. The closing prayer by Sis. Beatriz Alejo, regent of the Immaculate Conception-Karangalan Circle ended the activity.

A SUMMARY REPORT OF THE DMII SYNODAL CONSULTATION

The Daughters of Mary Immaculate International was one group which participated in the recently-concluded Synodal Consultations undertaken by all parishes and dioceses all over the country for submission to the Archdiocese of Manila and to Rome alongside those of other countries all over the world, in preparation for Synod 2023 when the Synod of Bishops meet to deliberate on the Church's journey in the 3rd Millennium.

The Consultation Process

The International Regent appointed three committee heads to initiate consultations in Regions I to V, VI to X and XI to XIV.

The DMII's consultation process was a combination of face-to-face and virtual meetings via Zoom. With groups of six to eight participants per circle/diocese. The circle regent/diocesan regent presided the meeting to explain the details of the Synodal Process and Consultation. The synodal process consisted of 1) Prayer to the Holy Spirit, listening and reflecting, 2) Discernment and 3) Participation.

The ten themes with guide questions provided in the Synod document were summarized into three main questions for the DMI:

- **1. SALAMAT:** What is the organization thankful for to the Church?
- **2. SANA:** What do you think is lacking in the Church? What does the DMI "dream" to have from the Church?
- **3. SIGURADO:** What can the DMI share with the Church?

The Consultation Experience: (Questions provided by the Synodal Process document)

1. What was most significant about the whole experience of the consultation? What are the high points and low points? What dispositions, attitudes or feelings were striking?

The participants felt happy that they were able to meet after a long time cloistered in their homes during the pandemic. They also welcomed the opportunity of being able to share their experiences and sentiments about their role in the Church and also became better aware of their duties and responsibilities as DMI members.

They also expressed the desire for their parish priests to be aware of the work they are doing for the DMI missions in their communities as well as those of the whole organization. As a result, more parishioners will know the DMI's role in the parish and be encouraged to join as members.

They also expressed the wish to erase the "myth" of the DMI as having only "well-to-do" members, thus their reluctance to join the organization.

Sama-samang paglalakbay is the heart of synodality. A listening Church and participative leadership will bring us all together in one journey towards a church for all.

- 1. The Journeying Companions
 - Family members
 - Other DMI sisters
 - Squirettes of Mary (SMI)
 - Parish Priest
 - Different Ministries in the Parish
 - Leaders
 - Catholic Organizations
 - Catholic Parishioners
 - Members of Religious Groups (Nuns, Priests, Brothers)

The road companions are:

- Inactive DMI members
- Parishioners who are not involved in church activities
- Non-practicing Catholics
- Church members in problematic and complex relationships

- Those who are busy with themselves
- Those who do not believe in God

The parish priest initiates and leads the journeying together in most parishes. All are included irrespective of their parties and positions in society. They are supposed to be together in the Church mission according to our faith. God is the one asking us to journey together. There is no selection process as to who must join and be included. People who refuse to heed the call are the ones who find themselves left behind in the journey.

As a Catholic organization, DMIs are thankful to the church for this initiative. It was a chance for everyone to join in a process of consultation and forming alliance through church projects through the Parish Council.

2. Over-all what were the fruits that the Holy Spirit has brought about through this experience?

This experience has brought about the virtues of patience, humility, and understanding especially for the Regents, Vicarial Regents and Diocesan Regent to set up the consultation meetings, explain to the members the synodality process, act as facilitators and notetakers during the consultation and encourage members to participate in the process despite the short time given to the organization to conduct the whole synodal process.

The commitment of members to the DMI was brought to the fore as they joyfully participated in the process and completed the writing of the Consultation Reports of their respective circles and vicariates.


- 2. The DMIs are grateful to the Church for opening its doors to its members to participate in church activities such as Marian events.

- 5. The DMIs are grateful that the Church has supported them in bringing the devotion to the Blessed Mother closer to churchgoers and their families.
- 6. The DMIs are grateful that the Church serves as its guardian and protector, a perfect place for worship.
- 7. The DMIs are grateful to the Church because it gives the members the spiritual, mental and emotional strength they need. It gives them the courage to face life's trials.
- 8. The DMIs are grateful that the Church has kept their faith especially during this pandemic.
- 9. The DMIs are grateful and proud to be Roman Catholics and so grateful to be part of their respective parishes.

Reflections on SANA -

- 1. The DMI participants desire to strengthen their partnership with the parish by involving themselves with the mission of the church by working through the parish social services ministry, obtaining proper training and learning to become a catechist, and helping the church in its feeding programs and other basic ecclesial community programs.
- 2. Participants envision that the church should be more in touch not only with members

- church organizations and regular churchgoers, but also with the community. The parish priest should not be untouchable but should be approachable. There should be regular dialogues with the parish priest and church groups like the DMII to avoid misunderstandings and to put forward areas for improvement in interpersonal relationships among members of church organizations. Often it is what the priest desires that is implemented and followed. Members of church organizations (even the Parish Pastoral Council) become obedient enforcers of what the priest wants.
- 3. Participants desire to see more unity among members of church organizations. There are times when an activity is spearheaded by the DMI, other church organizations shy away from joining and/or reluctant to become part of the activity. Members of the DMI are oftentimes viewed as rich and well to do. It is the hope of the DMIs that the priest and the church to be a uniting force among church organizations and churchgoers so as to achieve the joy of journeying together towards the Church mission.
- 4. The Church should harness the youth including the Squirettes of Mary to be involved in church services like the choir groups, lectors, commentators, etc.
- 5. DMIs hope that people appreciate and recognize the Church everyday and not only when they are in need of something. Attending Mass enhances one's mood and improves one's spiritual health. It not an opportunity to flaunt one's new clothes

- or jewelry. It is an opportunity to strengthen our faith. The church is a glorious place for prayer, peace and reflection.
- 6. There should be more open communications and more participation and involvement of parishioners and lay people. Extend assistance to those small church organizations and groups who are not so active because they are not given recognition or support. Support is not necessarily only financial but also encouragement that what they are doing is good.
- 7. There is a need for sustainable projects to be embarked on by the church for the poor in the community. There is a need for a social media technician to take care of our online live streaming to improve our virtual masses.
- 8. The church is the focal point in bringing the Blessed Mother closer to the churchgoers and the community. Activities of the DMI like the living rosary, 2000 Hail Marys, novenas and triduum in honor of the Blessed Mother should be supported by the parish priest as this will encourage the churchgoers to join and participate in these activities.
- 9. What is lacking in the church now is discipline. Some people are allowed to enter the church dressed indecently. Also, tolerating coming to mass late and taking the Holy Eucharist for granted. There's a need for more reminders.
- 10. It is hoped that there will be more teachings on the Word of God, Basic Catechism, etc. whether face to face or online.



Reflections on SIGURADO

- 1. The DMI is composed of a pool of women in various fields of profession and endeavor who can be tapped to render their services and talents to the Church in various mission work (medical/dental, education, skills training, legal, social and print media and finance).
- 2. At the parish level, the DMIs can be active workers in social services and BEC programs.
- 3. The DMIs can help the church in deepening the knowledge and awareness of churchgoers and believers about the Blessed Mother and in propagating devotion to her.

Feedback

Among the feedback from the circle meetings, what was particularly significant, surprising or unexpected? What new perspectives or new horizons opened up?

- 1. Journeying together during the pandemic had proven difficult for senior citizens who are locked in their homes. DMIs are grateful for the opening of churches later, limited at first, with pandemic protocols still in place and strictly observed for everyone's safety.
- 2. Listening. The Church needs to listen to anybody who desires to be heard for advice or counsel. Conflicting opinions, discrimination and biases sometimes hinder communication with lay people. The underprivileged and marginalized sector needs to be heard. There's need to understand opinions different from ours. Let's listen both with our ears and our hearts.

As for the DMIs, majority of their parish priests listen to the lay people, particularly through the church's projects and activities and prayer meetings.

- **3. Speaking Out.** There should be freedom of speech for everyone. However, the right to speak should be used to unite and not destroy the group and blend it into a functioning and united one.
- **4.** Celebrating. Journeying together requires a communal listening to the Word of God and celebration of the Eucharist together. This strengthens our faith in God and enlivens our

- spirit in following the path leading to Jesus. Training, recollections and retreats are also means of celebrating.
- 5. Co-responsible in the Mission. The Church is the Church of the Poor the poor in spirit and the poor in material things. The Church's mission is evangelization on the Words of God and the Kingdom of God through the Sacraments, the Eucharistic celebration, the Bible, ensuring justice for the poor and care for the people and the environment. Parishioners who do not live up to Christian virtues are poor in spirit themselves and cannot be coresponsible with the Church's mission.

This co-responsibility in the mission is shown and implemented through various means such as –

- Formation of BEC (Basic Ecclesial Communities) or MSKs (Munting Sambayanang Kristiyano)
- Participation in the PPCRV (Parish Pastoral Council for Responsible Voting)
- Providing guidance in the choice of elective national officials
- In the care for the environment
- Providing scholarships to poor but deserving students from the community.
- 6. Dialogue in Church and Society. Dialogues between Church and society are done through meetings of the PPC and UBAS (Ugnayan ng Barangay at Simbahan). Collaboration with other dioceses is done through meetings of officers of church organizations like DMI, CWL, KC, etc.. With the DMI, there were Parish Synodal Teams where parish org's and ministries were participants as well as the DMI Consultation Team at the same time. Radio programs are one venue used by the DMII to make its missions and other activities known.
- 7. With Other Christian Denominations Ecumenism. It is important to observe the proper mindset and attitudes in dialogues with other denominations and observe healthy discussions with them. This is observed by the Catholic Church in the distribution of aid in calamity

areas. Charity and love to all is practiced.

The DMII brings back faithful to the Church through sponsorship of mass weddings and baptisms.

8. Authority and Participation. Meetings of the Parish Pastoral Council ensure the participation of the lay community in the plans and activities of the Church. There is participative management observed vs. authoritative management where the parish priest's decision prevails. This, however, does not happen in some parishes. There is need for rapport between the priest and the lay people of the parish.

Supporting the Church through financial offerings, tithes and patronizing products and services of co-members are our responsibility for the Church of the Poor.

9. Discerning and Deciding. During monthly meetings, the parish priest and all officers of the PPC sit down and discuss problems/issues

at hand. The pros and cons are presented before any decision is arrived at.. The old adage – two heads are better than one – is clearly practiced here. Presentation of opinions – whether for or against – is employed.

The DMII assures its unceasing support to the church, its projects and humanitarian service to fellow men, be they church members or fellow Filipinos who are in dire need of help through medical missions, food pantry, etc.

10. Forming Ourselves in Synodality. Most parish priests introduce Synodality in their parish by way of open communication with church organization leaders, formation seminars/recollections. Bible studies are organized. Church organizations are encouraged to do their respective missions and the needed support, if ever, is given. Organizations are reminded to demonstrate preferential treatment for the poor within accepted procedures and processes.


